<p><b>First Year</b></p> <p>A student’s first year is an opportunity to discover their skills, interests, values, identity and goals. Through exploring the curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular, and social life, students begin to develop a sense of belonging and to integrate themselves into the Furman community. <p><b>Sophomore Year</b></p> <p>Sophomore year is often characterized as a time in which the newness of college and thrill of being away from home fades. It is replaced by pressure to declare a major, choose a career, decide whether to study away, complete research or an internship, and find a group of friends. It can be a time of uncertainty, growth, and lack of motivation. Without the structure of the first year, sophomores may feel lost, stressed, and relationships may feel complicated.</p> <p>By the end of their sophomore year, students will be asked to make a decision about a major course (or courses) of study. This involves finding a major that would not only help the student meet life and career goals, but that the student also finds appealing and fulfilling. <p><b>Junior Year</b></p> <p>In the junior year, students begin to focus their study in a major. It is also a time for students to take the initiative to seek out opportunities where they are able to apply their developing knowledge and skills to meet real-world challenges, through opportunities such as internships, community engagement projects, or research experiences. Students will also begin to think about what lies beyond Furman and explore potential graduate/professional programs or careers of interest. Many students choose to study away during all or part of their junior year. <p><b>Senior Year</b></p> <p>Seniors approaching graduation have many obvious stressors such as completing his or her course work, after graduation plans, and overall anxiety around leaving and entering the “real world”.
