The Things She Carried is the first full length scholarly study of the role purses have played in American history and culture. It argues that purses have functioned as versatile toolkits which provided women with a private, female-controlled space in a world where they rarely occupied public space on equal terms with men. Covering 150 years, the book uses material artifacts, photographs, memoirs, diaries, newspaper articles, oral histories, advertisements and more to illustrate how generations of women (and men) effectively deployed purses in their efforts to move from the margins of society to the middle.

The Prettiest Girl on Stage examines popular representations of gender and race in American vaudeville, analyzing the lives and work of four popular performers and contextualizing their significance within contemporary cultural themes. The book explores the multiplicity of shifting gender and racial identities and contributes a more nuanced understanding of the interrelated nature of gender and race ideologies in American history. The Prettiest Girl has been positively reviewed by scholars in The Journal of American History, The Journal of Southern History, and Pacific Historical Review.
